Introduction

Children can benefit educationally and emotional, increase their understanding of responsibility and develop empathy and nurturing skills, through contact with a suitable, calm dog. In addition to these benefits, children take great enjoyment from interaction with animals. By having a GEORGE - our SCHOOL DOG', we want to encourage those children who are vulnerable, or those less confident at reading to have a friendly audience and look forward to reading as a treat. Children who need support with mental health and wellbeing will have time to benefit from the calming effect a dog has. Children with punctuality issues will have specific tasks to encourage them to be in school for the dog. The breed of schnauzer, is carefully selected as suitable for this type of environment. George is well cared for and responsibly owned by the School Head Teacher, Mrs Cappleman-Jackson.



Is there a risk in bringing a dog into a school environment?

This policy shows that we have thought carefully about school life with a dog and how, through careful management, there is a very low risk of harm.

Context

- George will be owned by Mrs Cappleman-Jackson
- Veterinary costs will be covered by the owner
- George is a miniature schnauzer, chosen for his very mild temperament and non-molting coat. George is a hypoallergenic dog.
- The risk assessment (attached) will be reviewed annually
- Visitor and new pupils will be informed of the dog on arrival

Management day-to-day.

George will:

- Not be allowed in school if he is unwell
- Not be outside in adverse weather conditions
- Be kept on a lead when moving between classrooms or on a walk
- Be under the full control and supervision of an adult at all times
- Be fully trained to a bed
- Have had all injections prior to joining the school

(George's wellbeing will be monitored through the Dog Welfare and Wellbeing

Standard)

Pupils will:

- NOT have sole responsibility for, or be left alone with George
- Meet George in a group of no more than three children
 - Be reminded of what is appropriate behaviour around George every time they meet him
 - Always remain calm
 - Be gentle
 - Do not put your face near George's
 - Do not disturb a dog that is eating or sleeping
 - Always approach George standing up
 - Do not feed the dog unless directed to give dog treats
 - Learn about how dogs express their feelings through their body language. Growling or baring of teeth indicates that the dog feels threatened or angry. Flattened ears, tail lowered or between their legs, hiding behind their owner, whining or growling are signs that the dog is frightened or nervous. If George is displaying any of these signs, he should immediately be removed from that particular situation or environment.

Health and Safety Principles

Children will always wash their hands or use alcohol gel after handling the dog.

Any dog foul will be cleared up immediately and disposed of appropriately by the adult in charge of George at the time. Children must never be allowed to do this.

Should a bite occur (even playfully):

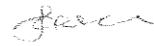
1. Parents will be contacted immediately

2. The wound will be cleaned and covered with a sterile, non-sticky dressing
3. The child/adult will be released for medical attention
4. All staff will be informed
5. A full investigation will take place
6. The suitability of having a dog will be reassessed by the Governing Body

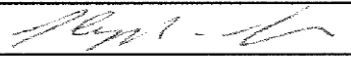
This policy is reviewed annually by the Headteacher, in consultation with the Chair of Governors.
